Introducing Mike Simm



Building Progress

As you are probably aware an increased need for care, and in particular specialised care for those with dementia, means that we currently don't have enough beds to meet demand. This has meant some families have had to place a parent in care in Whangarei until a room becomes available locally.

To increase capacity we have undertaken a significant expansion project which will enable us to provide an additional three bedrooms and upgrade the kitchen living and dining areas in the Dementia Unit. We will also be adding two new bedrooms in the rest home and extending the main kitchen.

Building commenced in January and we are now about a third of the way through the project having completed one of the dementia rooms, some service rooms and the new entrance into the dementia wing.

Also well on its way is the new lounge and dining area in the Dementia Unit with new carpet and vinyl about to be laid and the new kitchen installation imminent.

Work has also started on the new laundry and household management area and this is expected to be finished near the end of April.

The development will incorporate some very useful new technology designed to make life easier for residents, their families and staff.

One such example is the improved access to the Dementia Unit which must remain secure to prevent those with dementia wandering off and getting lost. Until now it was necessary to manually enter a code to access or leave the unit but the new door, which is built of solid timber and resembles an ordinary front door, contains Electromagnetic Proximity Locks.

This allows you to enter the Dementia Unit as you would any other part of the care facility but to leave, you must have an electromagnetic tag which automatically unlocks the door as you approach. This makes it faster for us to respond in an emergency and is a less conspicuous way of keeping our residents safe and secure. Family members and approved visitors will be issued with an access tag. Another useful innovation is the installation of special movement sensors that alert staff to the fact that someone may need assistance getting out of bed, thereby reducing the risk of a fall.

The rooms we're adding are generously proportioned and have ensuites attached. They will have mod-cons such as electrically adjustable beds to help physically impaired residents get in and out of bed safely and pull switches to enable residents to activate lights from their bed. Every extra detail that we add allows residents to maintain their dignity and independence.

The extensions are a massive undertaking both logistically and financially with the project costing in excess of 1.2 million. Despite extensive planning and careful budgeting we have already encountered unforseen expenses due to a recent change in regulations that requires us to upgrade the firewalls and fire doors in line with new standards.

And even without the extra costs that always occur in any building project, we are incredibly stretched to complete the renovation and provide the standard of facility that our elderly residents deserve. Over the page is an example of the fit out costs for one room. The fit out costs are not part of the 1.2 million we budgeted for the actual build and we need to fundraise to provide the fixtures and fittings.

We are a registered charity so if you'd like to make a general contribution, sponsor a piece of furniture or donate the cost of a whole room fit out, we'd be grateful for any support you can give us.

This is a particularly trying time for the residents and staff, especially in the Dementia Unit. It is noisy and dusty so if you have some spare time you might like to provide a reprieve by taking a resident out for a drive, a walk, a coffee or simply a change of scene within the Village.
