And after four long years of planning, the Community Centre is underway, so that's a good note on which to leave.

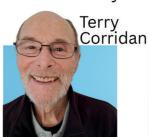
Thank you everyone for the wonderful time I have had at the Village. I go with much love for the Village and all its people.

Nordic Wellness Chair

In a quiet corner of the Care Facility sits our wellness chair. This gentle rocker with soothing music creates a calm space for relaxation and mental well-being. It's especially beneficial for residents with Parkinson's, easing anxiety and lifting mood. Thanks to volunteers, the chair now operates four days a week and is making a real difference in residents' lives.

Keeping residents moving: our in-house physiotherapy team

The Village funds a physiotherapy service, seeing it as essential to ageing well. Jenny, our physiotherapist and her assistant, Rosalyn assess mobility and create tailored programmes. They also run weekly Sit Fit, Tai Chi, and Balance classes to promote strength, coordination, and

confidence. Their work extends to falls prevention, breathing exercises, equipment checks, and staff training, helping residents stay mobile and independent for longer. We're proud of this vital service and remain committed to growing it as resources allow.



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In addition to overseeing Health & Safety to ensure staff, residents, and visitors alike remain safe within the Village, **Artie** also looks after the Quality Assurance processes required for our Ministry of Health Certification.

With 10 over years industry experience, Artie is well equipped for the role. Previous jobs include being a self-employed Safety Consultant, working as the Health & Safety

Recycling - Wellness Programme

It's great when our community helps shape us. **Anouk Van Donzel**, Environmental Educator, joined to support our **Wellness Programme** with Kerikeri recycling updates and to share resources on composting and worm farming. We discussed reducing household waste, what you can recycle (and the fact that coloured PET #1 is no longer recyclable), and noted the new kerbside recycling provider. We agreed packaging reduction should come first, with composting as a key waste-cutting method. Cold composting, worm farming, vermicast, and worm tea were covered. Great turnout across departments, with New World vouchers as spot prizes.

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
