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The Household Team at Kerikeri Retirement Village

The Household Department handles the kitchen and cleaning services for Kerikeri Retirement Village as well as 'Meals on Wheels' for the Kerikeri area.

The kitchen is a fun place to work but it can also be stressful getting the timing right so that everything is prepared, cooked and delivered on time.

We serve close to 60 breakfasts and about the same number of evening meals.

At lunch, which is our residents' main meal, we prepare up to 100 meals. Around 30 of these go to 'Meals on Wheels' and are delivered to people within the community by Red Cross volunteers. We also supply some of our Cottage and Wendywood residents with this service.

The kitchen Team includes:

Day Cook **Joy Dann** travels from Towai each day to work so has an early start to be at work by 5.30am. Joy's interests include spending time with her family, walking and gardening.

Kura Collins our other Day Cook, lives in Kerikeri. Kura is a crossword and suduko whiz and loves reading, fishing and gathering oysters. Assisting the Day Cooks is Kitchen Hand **Helen Wilding** who lives in Waipapa. She's into writing and music. Past jobs include working for the NZ Herald and as a Dental Assistant for her father when he was a local dentist.

Evening meals are handled by Dinner Cooks **Lilly Anderson** and **Kalala Bailey**. Lilly lives at Matauri Bay and likes fishing, gardening and camping down at the beach. Kalala loves spending time with her family, is a keen gardener and breeds budgies.

Another important part of the team is Kitchen Hand and Relief Dinner Cook **Michelle Ruatoto**. Michelle leads a busy family life and over winter can usually be found supporting her son's rugby team.

Linda Bayley juggles family life with three days a week here serving meals and doing the dishes for our Day Centre Programme.

Another important division within Household is the Cleaning Department. They're a happy bunch and they take pride in keeping things shipshape and pleasant for our residents.

the mail for Kerikeri before working here as a Cleaner – one busy lady!

Remember When ... JOAN NICHOLS RECALLS HER EARLY DAYS FLYING.

During the war, while in the Fleet Air Arm in Ceylon, Joan learned to fly an old Tiger Moth as a hobby. This proved quite expensive so the next best thing was to become an Air Hostess; however in 1947 they were a rare breed as most cabin staff were male.

Joan longed to visit Canada, South Africa and New Zealand but settled in a mining town just outside Johannesburg in South Africa where she got a job as an Air Hostess with a charter airline running DC3 planes. They were 24 seaters with a single row down the port side and a double row on the starboard, a cramped galley down the back and a primitive loo.

There was minimal training and looking back Joan thinks it was a pretty tin-pot outfit!

Depending on the weather they flew at anywhere between 5 and 10,000 feet at approximately 200mph.

It was a great thrill for the passengers to fly low and see the wild game - herds of wildebeests, zebra, gazelles and sometimes elephants.

With the African heat there was always plenty of turbulence and

it was always bumpy when dishing out 'meals'. The meals were a far cry from what is served today... a lunch box with curly sandwiches, a hard boiled egg, biscuits, a lump of cheese and an apple. A big urn from the galley provided tea which was served in plastic cups.

In those days there was no night flying so around dusk they would land on some out of the way airstrip and stay the night at the local hotel in places like Juba, Tabora and Ndola in the middle of Africa. Two interesting night stops were Khartoum and Wadi Halfa in the Sudan. In Khartoum when the hotel was full they slept in cabins or a house boat on the Nile.

The passenger terminals were primitive huts and the local natives would come and stare at the great silver bird that had swooped down from the sky.

The next morning at first light they were on their way again.

A flight from Johannesburg to London could take anything up to five days.

These were exciting days and pro-



vided a great opportunity to see the world.

After a spell in Nairobi running a small Airline Hotel Joan returned to England and joined 'Airwork', a larger charter airline, where she spent the next few years flying to and from the Far East.

During this time Joan met her husband, a Captain with BOAC and a New Zealander to boot! And that's how she come to live in New Zealand.

Just Add Water!

Humans, like plants, need water and nutrition to survive.

The body is held up straight by hydrostatic pressure through fascia. Fascia is made up primarily of collagen fibres that create a full body system of sheets and bags that wrap, divide and permeate every one of your muscles, bones, nerves, blood vessels and organs. Fascia webs its way through your insides like spider webs - every bit of you is encased in it!

Through activity, the water within your body can be stored in the thin layers of cells of the fascia. Think of it as being similar to when you pump up an inflatable mattress and it develops structure and shape.

When the fascial tissues of your body are "well soaked" they function as a support system holding your body up and taking pressure off your joints, organs and other tissues.

A shortage of water and/or activity means less hydrostatic pressure within your support system... it becomes an effort for your body to hold itself up... and may lead to aches, pains and disease.

Helen Norman was an inaugural member of the Village Trust in her capacity as Board Secretary.

During her career Helen was a Legal Secretary and subsequently kept the minutes for the Board since its inception until September this year. Helen played a pivotal part in the founding of the village and her knowledge of our origins and the changes that have occurred along the way is legendary. Her contribution to the village over more than 26 years cannot be measured.

History and What Might Have Been HELEN AND BRUCE NORMAN – 2012

Since 1968 when Bruce and I became residents in Kerikeri, we have had an annual visit from a representative from the Presbyterian Church's Social Services.

He would tour the North on a fundraising expedition seeking monies for PSSN' orphanages and old people's homes and other social activities of the Church. Over the years Mr de Ruiter, came to know us very well. He knew we were living on a 13 acre block of mainly bare land on Hone Heke Road which was zoned Residential in 1969 by the Bay of Islands County Council.

One year, in the early 1980's, Mr de Ruiter and a Property Officer from the Presbyterian Church came to visit us to say that they were very interested in negotiating to buy our property for development as a retirement village. Together we walked all over our property and as we passed the boundary of the bare land which now comprises the Kerikeri Retirement Village I pointed over the fence to the land covered in weeds and old rundown orchards and said to our two visitors "now that's a better area for development. It's got a flatter contour than our land and is available for sale."

I also knew of the dreams and plans of the Jock Graveson and Herb Murray Trusts so I suggested they talk to Ian Knox and Gollon Baker Hewson who were involved with these Trusts. And that's how the Presbyterian



Church came to be involved in the establishment of the Kerikeri Retirement Village.

What if I hadn't pointed out a different way forward for those two men? What if Bruce and I had sold them our land to allow them to develop their retirement village? What if? We will never know. That is history – the road forks and we follow one of the ways.

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Gordon Bell
