We are very pleased to have been awarded funding from EECA (Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority) to buy a small fleet of electric cars which will be available for hire – we are the first retirement village in New Zealand to start a fleet of electric cars for car sharing. These will be hitting the Village in April.

Our fete on March 2<sup>nd</sup> was a lot of fun and shenanigans. Thanks to all who donated goods and gave their time to make this a success.

We'll be starting our speaker series again in March in the Social

Centre, keep your eyes peeled for notices and all are welcome.

Jan Bennenbroek, our Clinical Manager, has just celebrated 15 years with the Village. Jan has been a tower of strength for the Village over this time. She started with us as a Registered Nurse and took over as Clinical Manager in 2007. Since I started here Jan has been a huge support for me and I have been so impressed with her commitment and love of the Village.

The great NZ Census took place on March 6<sup>th</sup>. I think this caused quite a bit of consternation with the new online version, so thanks to those

who offered to help others. Online is not for everyone!

Of significant note, our hens in the Tui Wing have started laying eggs which is hugely exciting. Henrietta and Harriet are wandering around in the garden, just as they would have in many of our residents own gardens, before moving to the village.

A plea from our diversional therapists – we always welcome donations of good magazines. We are particularly short of magazines which appeal to the men who live here; hunting, fishing, boating, farming, sports etc.

## Kevin is going to town!

In a New Zealand first for the retirement sector, we are buying a Kia Soul and three Nissan Leaf electric vehicles, (known as EVs), for use in a car-sharing initiative for residents. We'll also have one of these Zero emission vehicles for staff use and we hope to have the fleet in place by April 30<sup>th</sup>.

The fleet will be known as the Kerikeri Electric Vehicle Network for Seniors, or KEVNS which we are calling 'Kevins.'

The project is funded jointly and equally by the Kerikeri Village Trust and a grant from the Low Emission Vehicles Contestable Fund, administered by the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority (EECA).

We think it makes all sorts of sense as our residents typically travel short distances and it saves the expense of owning and maintaining a traditional combustion engine vehicle. Car sharing is a great way to reduce transport costs for our residents and to increase energy efficiency.

As part of the EV project we have funding available to install a fast charger in Kerikeri. We are consulting with NRC and local EV expert Craig Salmon about the best siting of this charger for the benefit of all of Kerikeri.

In the long term we'd like to make car sharing available to the wider public but there are many logistics to be sorted first. In the mean time watch this (car parking) space...
